

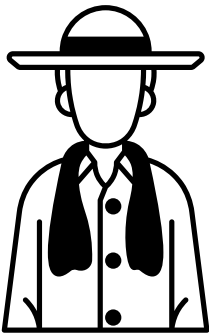
WIND DELIVERS TAX RELIEF IN ILLINOIS

Taxable revenue from **wind** projects is very steady predictable income!

Wind energy accounts for:

- **\$13.7 billion** in **capital investments**
- **\$47 million** in **payments** to **landowners**
- **\$57.9 million** in **state** and **local taxes**¹

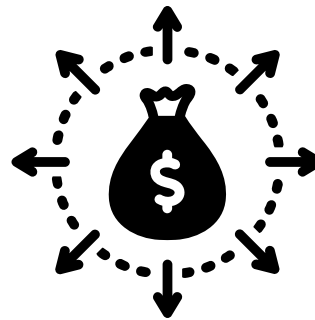
Wind delivers **many economic benefits:**

- **65 long-term jobs**



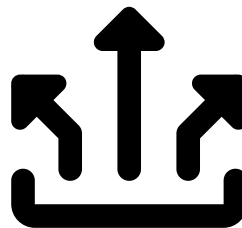
New Earnings with wind:

- **\$1.1 billion** during construction
- **\$66 million** long-term
